All sunshine makes a desert. The eternal God, whom we serve, knew that long before men "...for he maketh his sun to rise on the evil and on the good, and sendeth rain on the just and on the unjust" (Matthew 5:45). God sends both sunshine and rain, there must be a balance.

lives. If everything always happened just as we expected and wanted, we would never see challenge. We would never grow if we did not meet some resistance as we went about our life of service. Difficulty and change are part of what we need in life. Just as our bodies need some resistance, so do our minds.

When you read the Scriptures, do you focus on the familiar, easy passages, or do you seek sometimes to glean better understanding from those areas that seem more difficult? We have studied both Acts and Revelation in the recent past, and in a general sense, those two books are on either end of the difficulty spectrum. Acts is pretty straightforward and easy to understand, while Revelation is sometimes hard to read, not to mention understand. How do you approach these two studies? I know I usually spend much more time reading and preparing for Revelation because of its difficulty. Because of such focus, I feel, I have gained a better understanding of some of the symbols and how the teachings found there can benefit us today.

But let me turn this idea around for a moment. Should studying a less difficult book, like Acts, mean that we spend less time and effort in gaining an understanding of its precepts and teaching? While Acts may be straightforward and easy to grasp, it lays before us the foundations of our relationship to God and one another. These teachings are vital to our work for the Lord. Only with focus and diligence will we make these things a part of our life. We need to be diligent in all study. It is good to read the Bible daily, but we also need to dig deep in the well of God's Truth.

We also need to see balance in our everyday activities. Work is necessary, whether we are on the job or at home. There are always things that need to be done, maintenance, repair, cleaning are things that each one must deal with regularly. But we also need to find time to be refreshed. Just sitting on the porch for a few minutes watching the birds and squirrels in our yard can do wonders for our mind and body. Yet we cannot sit around doing nothing all the time or we will waste away. Eating and exercise are two sides of the same coin, so to speak, if we want to remain healthy.

Only eating, or only resting, or only reading Scripture is like getting only sunshine all day, every day. It might sound good, but without balance we cannot live and grow. We need rain and fog just as much as we need sunshine for this Earth to continue. We need exercise and work along with food and rest for our bodies to grow.

We need some Scripture reading and we also need some diligent Scripture digging if we want our minds and spirits to grow and be useful for the Lord.
